Happy New Year!

Welcome to the first edition for 2011 of our regular newsletter for all those who work with and for young children and their families in Medway.

We all know that the coming year will be difficult for families as the impact of job losses, price rises and tight finances continues to hit home. For those of us who work to support children, this means increased demands and a continued need to ensure that we work ever harder to help those families.

But 2011 will also be a year of intense pressure on public finances, with some very tough decisions being taken by politicians both locally and in government about what to spend money on. In Medway, the Council, the NHS and many other publicly-funded organisations are grappling with these challenges as they seek to set budgets for the coming years.

Yet at the same time, there is a growing consensus in the country regarding the unique importance of the early years in shaping future life chances. In recent months a number of reports, speeches and research findings by academics, scientists, policy-makers and politicians from across the spectrum have highlighted evidence that the right support in the early years is the single most important thing in determining what sort of life a child will go on to have.

Frank Field MP was commissioned by the government to look at new ways of addressing child poverty. His report concluded that in order to prevent poor children becoming poor adults, the UK needs a concerted focus on high quality care, learning and parenting support in the earliest years of life. "There are huge class differences in the range of children's abilities measurable on their first day at school. For many poor children life's race is by then already effectively over."

C4EO is an organisation that looks at effective practice in the UK and beyond. Their recent report, "Grasping the Nettle: Early Intervention For Children Families and Communities" also highlights the critical importance of the early years and in particular how language and communication skills need to be addressed before the age of $5\frac{1}{2}$ years. The key finding of this report is that early intervention works, and it works best when it happens in the early years.

In Medway, we have made huge strides in giving children a better start in life, and in ensuring that those children born into difficult circumstances have as good a chance as is possible to experience positive things in their first few years. We can see this each and every day in the pre-schools, nurseries, Sure Start Children's Centres, childminders' homes and play facilities across Medway. And we have scientific and statistical evidence to show the progress that children are making.

That is testament to the skills, commitment and energy of all of you who work with children and their families. Our task for 2011, whatever the new challenges, is to keep on making that difference.

Charity Commission — requirements and guidance

If your setting is a registered charity you will be aware that you have to send information to the Charity Commission on an annual basis. There have been some changes during the past year regarding the information that is required.



The nature of the information varies dependent on your annual income.

If your setting income is *more* than £25,000 per year you are required to provide both an:

- Annual Return and
- Trustee's Annual Report (TAR) complete with financial accounts

If your setting income is *less* than £25,000 per year you may only be required to provide an:

Annual Return

We are aware that a number of settings are overdue in providing their annual information to the Charities Commission. We strongly urge you to check that your setting has fulfilled its responsibilities, and forward any outstanding information as soon as possible.

Speech and Language Advice Drop-in Clinics

From January 2011 NHS Medway's Speech and Language Advice service for children will be changing. In addition to the three existing venues, a fourth children's centre will now be hosting the advice clinic on a monthly basis, meaning that there will be an advice clinic running somewhere in Medway four times per month.

The advice drop-in clinics are open to parents and carers of children aged two to four, who have not yet entered reception year at school. The clinics provide an opportunity for parents and carers to speak with a Speech and Language Therapist about any concerns about their child's speech and language progress.

The Advice Drop-in sessions, for which parents and carers do not need to make an appointment to attend, will continue to run from Bligh Children's Centre in Strood, Wayfield Children's Centre in Chatham and Saxon Way Children's Centre in Gillingham. Additionally, Hand in Hand Children's Centre in Twydall will also be hosting monthly advice clinic drop-in sessions.

Sessions will be supported by children's centre staff and will look to identify those children who have a genuine speech and language difficulty and require a referral into the speech and language service. The advice clinics are for children that have not already been referred to the Speech and Language Advice service.

Operation of the sessions

The clinics will operate at the following days and times. Please note these dates and times are applicable from January 2011 to December 2011 inclusive.

- Bligh Children's Centre: 2nd Thursday of the month from 1.00pm to 2.30pm 01634 336220
- Wayfield Children's Centre: 4th Wednesday of the month from 9.30am to 11.00am 01634 843544
- Saxon Way Children's Centre: 1st Wednesday of the month from 10.45am to 12.30pm 01634 852320
- Hand in Hand Children's Centre: 3rd Tuesday of the month from 9.30am to 11.00am 01634 365985

Clinics operate on a non-appointment basis and there are a limited amount of time-slots available for parents and carers at any given advice clinic. Appointments are allocated on a first-come, first-served basis; parents that arrive later during the session may have to wait some time for an appointment, or may be unable to be allocated an appointment at all.

Healthy Eating Consultation

Medway's Healthy Weight Team have commissioned a family consultation across the Authority during January and February 2011 to seek views, attitudes and behaviours around healthy eating practices. This is to assist Easier ways to enjoy your food



future healthy eating work in becoming more effective in supporting behaviour changes. The target group for the consultation is families with children up to 18 years old and the consultation is hoping to reach a range of ages from this target group.

The consultation will be interactive and take a combined approach between on-street surveys, workshops and family interviews. The results of the consultation will determine what types of food initiatives are needed locally and will help support a co-ordinated approach between all partners to meet these needs.

Brompton Children's Centre celebrate a new family room

There's a whole lot more room for learning at the Sure Start Children's Centre in Brompton thanks to a spacious extension. Youngsters, parents and staff came to celebrate the official opening of the new look centre based at Brompton Westbrook Primary School on 3rd November.

It now has room for double the children and activities previously on offer. The changes included the addition of a kitchen with two cookers, which will be used to teach healthy cooking to families. Some children made camp fires out of coloured paper to place inside the dens and sing songs round their creation.



The fun days were aimed at children under five with additional needs and their families (including their older siblings), to give the whole family a chance to take part in a fun activity together and this was very well received.

Early Years & Childcare Professional Development Centre Adverse weather policy and procedure

In the event of adverse weather, for example, snow, ice, extreme winds, we reserve the right to postpone training, possibly at short notice.

The decision to postpone training will not be taken lightly but will consider the implications for individuals involved in the training, to include delegates, trainers and administrators.

The team at the PDC will endeavour to be aware of the five-day weather forecasts, particularly during the Autumn and Spring terms. In the interests of safety, if there are warnings of weather conditions that could potentially make travelling hazardous, a decision will be made as to whether training should be postponed.

In the event that training is postponed the procedure will be as follows:

- Wherever possible, delegates will be contacted by telephone before the date of the training to advise of postponement. As the weather is often unpredictable, it may be that you are not contacted until the morning of the training.
- There will be an announcement on www.e-learningatlast.org.uk and you do not need to be logged in to view this page.
- We will endeavour to arrange for an announcement to be made on Radio Kent. As we are co-located with Bligh Infant School and Bligh Junior School, the PDC will be closed if the schools are closed.
- If you have not received a telephone call, and you are unsure about whether the training may have been postponed, we recommend that you telephone to confirm whether the training will be taking place before starting your journey. - Delegates will be advised of an alternative date for the training as soon as this is arranged.

Fire Safety at Hempstead Pavilion Playgroup & St. Nicholas Playgroup

Two Medway settings learnt all about fire safety last term after the Fire Service paid them a visit. Fire Fighters from two services in Medway taught their budding new recruits about the role of a Fire Fighter and gave them some valuable lessons in staying safe.



Hempstead Pavilion Playgroup were visited by two of the Fire Fighters from their local service; the Fire Fighters were very patient with the children whose ages ranged from 18 months to 3 years and provided them with a lot of useful information in a simple format that they were able to understand.

The children had to count to twenty whilst the Fire Fighter put on his uniform, seeing if he could beat them, as Fire fighters must be able to don their whole uniform in twenty seconds! The children learnt that the Emergency telephone number is 999 & how to 'STOP, DROP & ROLL' if their clothes caught light.

The children then watched a DVD of 'Frances the Fire fly' before going out into the gated car park to see the Fire Engine! The Fire Fighters turned on the flashing lights and sirens and allowed each child a turn at using the fire hose.

After the visit the children put everything they had learned into practice by dressing up as fire fighters and using their experience to act out the role of a Fire Fighter. The children really enjoyed the experience and had a fantastic time learning some valuable lessons in staying safe.



Over in Strood, St. Nicholas Playgroup were visited by some of their local Fire Fighters from the Strood White Watch, who came to talk to the children about fire safety. The staff at St. Nicholas Playgroup carry out regular fire drills and talk to the children about keeping safe, so the children were well prepared to answer some of Fireman Mark and Fireman Sam's questions!

The children were able to use the fire hose and squirted water onto the grass. Children and staff were given a tour of the fire engine and were shown all of the equipment and what it is used for; Fireman Mark was most impressed with the children's knowledge especially Charlie, aged 3, who knew the name for the Fire Fighters' cutters 'The jaws of life'.

The children and staff had a lovely morning with the team from Strood White Watch; to say thank you to the Fire Fighters the children immediately set to work, drawing pictures to send in to the Fire Station!



A big thank you to both teams of Fire Fighters and well done to the staff and children at both settings!

A Cambodian Experience

Following a trip to Cambodia in November, Early Years Admin, Budget and Finance Manager Trevor Hughes gives an insight into schooling in Cambodia...

On the 24th November I was on a tour of Cambodia, part of which involved a boat trip around a floating village on the Tonle Sap Lake. Some of the houses are fixed on stilts, whilst others are completely free and float around as the level of the lake goes up and down.

As we were travelling along, the guide pointed out a floating school the 'Kompong Khleang Floating Primary School' and one of our party asked if it was possible to have a look inside. We pulled up alongside the school and clambered over the balustrades; it was lunchtime, so we weren't disturbing any lessons, but there were still quite a lot of children there.





In Cambodia, because of the lack of skilled teachers, children only get four hours of schooling per day in either a morning or afternoon session; these sessions run from 7am to 11am and 1pm to 5pm. The Catholic backed school has as many as 225 pupils per day over the 2 sessions with just one teacher.

The building itself was partitioned into two by a curtain and had very little equipment with just low desks for the children to work on and no chairs, leaving the children to sit or kneel on the floor. It was quite hot for us at around 30°C, and temperature remains constant throughout the year.

Despite all of this, the children were delightful, eager to learn and so willing to interact with us. One of our party spotted an A-Z alphabet chart and soon the children had sat down and were going through the alphabet with her, in English of course. We asked if they would sing for us and they were happy to do so, adding in actions to accompany their song.





When we left the children and their teacher came outside to wave us off. It was a lovely experience and all the better for being natural and unscripted. Later on we saw a boat full of children heading home from school, very different from anything in Medway.

Every Breakfast Club Matters Accreditation

On Tuesday 14th September 2010, the Early Years and Childcare Professional Development Centre held a celebration to congratulate the first group of Medway breakfast clubs to become accredited.

The 14 newly accredited breakfast clubs are held at All Saints Primary School, Gordon Road School, Melville and Brompton Breakfast & After School Club, Luton School, New Road School, Rockets @ Twydall, Play-a-way Activities Centre, Play-a-way Pre-School Day Nursery & Out of School Club, Bligh Junior School, St Michael's School, St. Mary's Island Primary, St. Margaret's School, Wayfield Primary and Woody's Breakfast & After School Club.



Mark Holmes, Strategic Manager for Early Years Services, gave a speech congratulating the providers on successfully becoming accredited breakfast clubs and handed out certificates individually to each club. The EBCM panellists, Aiming High Project Manager, Lesley Kedge, and Early Years Principle Officer, Richard Cooke, attended the celebration and the third panel member Kirsteen Harris, Quality Team Deputy Manager, sent her congratulations to the 14 Breakfast Clubs.

Every Breakfast Club Matters Accreditation portfolio has been developed for all breakfast clubs. whether they operate in a school, as part of another Playwork provision such as an after school club, or a childcare provision or a nursery. The accreditation is aimed at maintained, private, voluntary and independently run provisions, and is of particular use to breakfast clubs that are not registered by Ofsted.

The Playwork team at Medway Council acknowledge that breakfast clubs are not often given recognition for the good quality childcare that they provide for children of school age. It is crucial that children and young people in Medway get a well balanced, healthy breakfast to boost concentration and creativity, to talk to friends and socialise during this important part of the day before school; the Playwork team have therefore developed the portfolio to enable breakfast clubs to ensure that their good quality provision is recognised through the accreditation scheme. The scheme provides a benchmark of criteria that should be considered as a minimum standard of practice, whilst providing examples and ideas for future development. It is also a tool to demonstrate and celebrate good practice.

It was a wonderful day and the breakfast clubs should be pleased with themselves for all the hard work, commitment and time they have put in over the year. Congratulations all of you!
